41:01:03:01. Fees Established. A fifty-dollar fee shall be assessed for each habitat conservation

emblem set purchased under this chapter. A thirty-dollar fee shall be assessed for each habitat

conservation motorcycle emblem.

41:03:03:06. Park entrance license fees. Park entrance license fees are as follows:

The fee for an annual park entrance license for a resident is thirty six forty dollars. The fee for an annual park entrance license for a nonresident is sixty dollars;

(2) The fee for two annual park entrance licenses, if purchased together, is <u>fifty-four sixty</u> dollars for residents. For nonresidents, the fee is ninety dollars;

(3) The fee for a transferable annual park entrance license for a resident is eighty ninety dollars;

(4) The temporary park entrance license fee at Custer State Park is <u>twenty twenty-five</u> dollars for a vehicle or <u>twenty dollars for a motorcycle</u>, and is valid for seven consecutive days from the date of purchase in any state park or recreation area;

(5) Except at Custer State Park, the daily park entrance license fee is eight ten dollars per vehicle for residents, and fifteen dollars for nonresidents;

(6) For a vehicle that does not have a valid park entrance license displayed as required in § 41:03:03:02, the operator or the registered owner of the vehicle shall pay fifteen twenty dollars for a daily park entrance license for each day the vehicle is in the park, except at Custer State Park where the fee is twenty twenty-five dollars. The operator or registered owner may apply the entire amount of the cost of the daily park entrance license toward the purchase of an annual park entrance license;

(7) In lieu of the annual, daily, or temporary park entrance license fee, each person, except the driver and step-on guide, occupying a commercial motorcoach with a seating capacity of eight people or more in any state park or recreation area, must pay a park entrance license fee of three four dollars per person per day; and

(8) Any group or organization that hosts a private, one-day event at any state park or recreation area may pay, in lieu of any other park entrance license fee, a special one-day events park entrance license fee of fifty one hundred dollars, for each increment of fifty attendees, or any portion-thereof. The fee is payable in advance and no partial refunds may be given. The fee does not extend overnight. One-day events must have written consent of the park manager at least fifteen days prior to the event. Organized or hosted special one-day events are limited to weddings, wedding receptions, meetings, class or family reunions, corporate or organizational picnics, and banquets.

41:03:04:01. Definitions. As used in this chapter:

(1) "Basic campground" means a campground equipped with vault toilets if camping is allowed on camping pads, grassed areas, or parking lots;

(2) "Camper unit" means a powered vehicle, motor home, camping bus, pull-type camper, tent, or any other device designed for sleeping;

(3) "Campground site" or "campsite" means a specific camping pad or a temporary area that is specifically designated by the park manager;

(4) "Camping cabin" means a campsite with a wood structure provided by the department, furnished with beds and electricity;

(5) "Equestrian campground" means a campground designed to accommodate camper units with horses;

(6) "Family" means parents or grandparents and unmarried minor children;

(7) "Hard sided camper" means any type of device that is designed for sleeping and shelter that is attached to at least a single axle;

(8) "Large group camping reservation" means a reservation for a group camping loop at Lewis and Clark Recreation area or for<u>-10 ten</u> or more campsites at any other state park campground that accepts a group camping reservation;

(9) "Lodge" means a permanent structure provided by the department, furnished with beds, appliances, and home decor;

(10) "Modern cabin" means a campsite with a wood structure provided by the department, furnished with beds, electricity, sewer and water;

(11) "Modern campground" means a campground equipped with flush toilets, lavatories, hot showers, and individual camping pads;

(12) "Nonprofit youth group" means an organized group of persons under age 18, sponsored by a nonprofit organization, and accompanied by a smaller group of adult leaders that have been designated by the organization to provide supervision, guidance, and instruction to the group. Any adult accompanying the youth group for the primary purpose of supervising the adult's own children is not considered an adult leader of the group;

(13) "Preferred campground" means a modern campground with weekend occupancy of 80 percent to 89 percent from the Friday before Memorial Day through Labor Day on nonequestrian and electrical campsites;

(14) "Prime campground" means a modern campground with weekend occupancy of and greater than 90 percent from the Friday before Memorial Day through Labor Day on nonequestrian and electrical campsites;

(15) "Recreational vehicle campsite" means a campsite where a self-contained, pull-type camping unit designed for recreational use is provided by the department;

(16) "Rent-a-camper" means a campsite with a hard sided camper provided by the department, furnished with beds, appliances, and electricity;

(17) "Semi-modern campground" means a campground equipped with individual camping pads and either flush toilets and lavatories without showers or a shower house and vault toilets; and

(18)(13) "Suite" means a campsite with a wood structure that contains multiple rental units provided by the department, furnished with beds, electricity, sewer, and water.

41:03:04:03. Camping permit fees. The daily fee for the use of a campground site by one camper unit is as follows:

(1) Custer State Park modern campground fee, <u>\$26 twenty-seven dollars</u>, including State
Game Lodge; Sylvan Lake; Grace Coolidge; Legion Lake; Stockade North; Stockade South; and
Blue Bell;

(8) Preferred campground fee, \$19, including Fisher Grove; Buryanek; Oahe Downstream; Springfield; and West Bend;

(9) Prime campground fee, \$22, including all campsites furnished with sewer, water, and electrical service; Lewis and Clark; Chief White Crane; Angostura including Sheps Canyon; Palisades; Big Sioux; Lake Vermillion; Rocky Point; Mina Lake; Lake Herman; North Point; Walker's Point; Lake Poinsett; Oakwood Lakes; South Pelican; Newton Hills; Shadehill Ketterlings Point; Pickerel Lake; Lake Cochrane; Sandy Shore; Pierson Ranch; Union Grove; Richmond Lake; Pease Creek; Lake Thompson; Roy Lake; Farm Island; Snake Creek; Lake Louise; Hartford Beach; Randall Creek; and Fort Sisseton, except during the Fort Sisseton Festival in accordance with subdivision (6) of this section;

(10)(6) Custer State Park, French Creek Horse Camp fee, \$36 thirty-seven dollars;

(11)(7) Campsites designated for tent camping only, regardless of campground designation, \$15 sixteen dollars.

An additional charge of <u>four seven</u> dollars per unit is made for campground sites with electricity.

A resident of this state who may purchase a camping permit and campsite electrical service for one-half price pursuant to SDCL 41-17-13.4 shall submit written verification of that status from the United States Veterans Administration to the licensing office of the department in Pierre. The licensing office shall send the resident a billfold-size card to use as proof of eligibility for halfprice camping fees.

The nonprofit youth group camping fee is fifty cents for each person or six dollars, whichever is greater.

The Custer State Park group camping area fee is <u>seven eight</u> dollars a person for overnight use, with a minimum fee of <u>\$140</u> one hundred forty dollars.

41:03:04:03.02. Camping permit fees -- Cabins -- Lodges -- Suites. Fees for the following are:

(1) Camping cabin fee, <u>\$55</u> sixty dollars;

(2) Modern cabin and suite fees, <u>\$85 eighty-five dollars</u> to <u>\$205 two hundred fifty dollars</u> subject to size, amenities, and occupancy rates provided:

(a) The commission shall annually approve the schedule of fees; and

(b) Discounts to increase occupancy during periods of lower demand, may not exceed twenty-five percent of the approved fee;

(3) The group lodging fee at Lake Thompson State Recreation Area, Palisades State Park, Sheps Canyon State Recreation Area, and Newton Hills State Park, and Shadehill State Recreation Area is \$280 two hundred eighty dollars per night. The group lodging fee for Shadehill Recreation Area is three hundred dollars per night. Occupancy in excess of twelve persons shall be assessed a fee of for the first twelve persons plus \$10 ten dollars for each additional person with a maximum occupancy of fifteen persons;

(a) <u>\$40 forty dollars</u> per night for nonprofit youth groups year-round; and

41:03:04:05.01. Campsite reservations -- Payment of camping fees -- Cancellation fees. Nonprofit youth groups may reserve a designated group camping area for up to-14 <u>fourteen</u> consecutive nights.

A person may reserve an available campsite at any state park, recreation area, or lakeside use area for up to <u>14 fourteen</u> consecutive nights. After the person has occupied the campsite for <u>14 fourteen</u> consecutive nights, the person shall remove the person's camper unit from the state park, recreational area, or lake side use area, by check-out time the next day, for at least one night, before reserving that site, or another site, at that location.

Camping fees set in subdivisions 41:03:04:03(1) through (3), (7) through (13), and (15) must be paid for the entire duration of a camper's anticipated stay at the time the reservation is made. A person who either cancels a reservation for a campsite through the park reservation center or who cancels a reservation for a campsite, within-7 seven days of or after arrival at the park, shall pay one-half of one night's camping fee for each campsite reserved. A person who cancels a reservation for a camping fee for each campsite reserved. A person who cancels a reservation for a camping fee for each campsite reserved. A person who is not a resident of this state shall pay an additional <u>a</u> reservation fee of \$7.70 ten dollars for a reservation made online and shall pay <u>\$9.70 sixteen dollars</u> for a reservation made through the park reservation center. The reservation fee is nonrefundable and is payable in advance.
